

# Great Ohio Bicycle Adventure

On June 17-24, Northeast Ohio was invaded by over 2000 bicyclists and their support crews. For a week, these people of various backgrounds, were joined by a love of bicycling, and a desire to finish the 350 mile tour.

GOBA was divided into 7 daily rides of about 50 miles each. Wherever they stopped for the night, the campgrounds were dubbed "Gobaville", and the red carpet was rolled out for them. Alliance was no exception.

The group rolled into Alliance on Monday, June 19th. By 5 PM, local organizers were faced with crowds that would have rivaled the Warren Hamfest.

By 6 PM, just about every square inch of grass at Alliance High School was taken over by tents, and bicycles. (My favorite campsite had a pair of pink flamingos guarding the tent door, ed.)

As you know, GOBA communications are handled by Amateur Radio. In addition to our 17 volunteers, quite a few hams were riding along with the group, and the people in charge of GOBA are hams. Our people were organized by Don, K8OMO, who designated 5 checkpoints north of town on Monday, and 6 checkpoints south of town on Tuesday morning. Don spent most of Monday riding the route, making sure that everything ran smoothly.

Next year, GOBA will take place in the SE section of Ohio, and operators will be needed. Any takers?

## Field Day '95

Well, Field Day has come and gone for another year. It stormed. The food was good. What more can I say?.

We didn't do as well as last year, but I think that everyone will confess to having had a good time at this years Field Day. As usual, it was held behind Marlington Middle School.

This was the first year that we used the club call. Some of us hope that it's the last, since KB8YXT is a real pain on phone. In addition, we used N8MAA's call for the Novice/Technician station.

On CW, we made 155 contacts on 40, 20, and 2 Meters. This includes 3 packet contacts made by N3KNU. On voice, we made 220 contacts on 80, 40, and 2 Meters. This gave us a claimed score of 1060 points, before bonuses.

This year, we claimed bonuses for 100% emergency power, packet-radio, W1AW message, operating from a public place, and a special bonus for every ARRL member who made at least one contact.

It's said that an army travels on it's stomach. I think the same holds true for Field Day crews. Our stomachs were certainly satisfied during Field Day. Saturday night's dinner was provided by Nancy Morretta, XYL of Bill. N8TLY(SK). Nancy owns Padulah's in Massilon, and graciously catered our Field Day.

But the good food didn't end there. Chef David(N8NLZ) put in an appearance at breakfast. David, along with his lovely assistant, Dianna, proceeded to amaze the breakfast crowd with tons of pancakes and ham.

## Dit & Dah talk radios

Processors aren't always dicey by Tim & Al Magahertzzi

Dear Tim & Al:

How can I determine the bandwidth of my transmitted signal from my new Yaesu 890 transceiver? I'm also interested in what effect a processor may have. I hope to read your answer in the next column. Don, KM6SE

Tim: No problem, Don. This is an easy one! Borrow an old analog-dial receiver from a friend and put it next to your shiny new gear. Key up your transmitter and begin talking into the microphone. At the same time, tune your old receiver until you hear vourself. Then move the receiver dial back & forth from one side of you signal to the other until you no longer hear anything. Using a flexible measuring tape, measure the distance between those two points. A good narrow signal should be about one half inch long on SSB. One-inch signal width indicates bandwidth problems. And no perceivable signal means you are not talking loud enough.

Al: Don, that sounds like a method for carpenters. Maybe if you hit the rig firmly with a claw hammer, that would compress its bandwidth. A better way to measure your transmitter's bandwidth is with an RF spectrum analyzer. Most hams don't have these expensive honeys laying around the shack, but a friend can borrow one at work. A spectrum analyzer gives you a picture of the transmitted signal, including any unwanted distortion products, and it is calibrated to measure signal width directly.

Tim: I'll just leave it up to you. Don, as to which method of determining bandwidth seems more appropriate. My method is cheap, readily available, and does not require an engineering degree. As for processing, a good processor will slice, shred, chop, puree, and even knead. Cuisinart and Hamilton Beach are good brands. Either would serve you well.

Al: Tim, this is a radio column. Do you really think Don wants our opinions about food processors? Don, if your processor and automatic limiting controls are set properly, the transmitter bandwidth should be the same with the processor turned on or off. A processor gives you greater average RF output power, making your signal more readable in the noise. People often misinterpret the increased punch to mean a processed signal is wider, and give inaccurate signal reports.

Tim: Give me a break, Al. A speech processor can't even make a strawberry daiquiri. And Don, thanks for your question. I enjoyed giving sound advice to our readers.
