According to an article in the May '97 Zero Beat, the first commercial broadcast station wasn't KDKA, although that was the first to receive a license from the government. It was a station that began operating ten years earlier using a spark gap transmitter to broadcast a regular schedule of voice and phonograph music. can only imagine how wonmust have derful that sounded. The station was in San Jose, CA and its first call sign was 6XE. Later it became KQW and now it is licensed as KCBS in San Francisco. Its founder, a Dr. Herrold. Charles school to teach radiotelegraphy and he began the station to advertise his school. And get this: he stole the power from the local trolley line! That's what I call a real pi-The trolley rate station. company eventually stalled a permanent line and an electric meter.

April 3, 2002

The regular meeting of the Alliance Amateur Radio Club was held at the Alliance Community Hospital on April 3, 2002, at 7:30 P. M., with Robert Steele K8RLS, president, presiding. Secretary David Glass W8UKQ kept the minutes. There were 22 members and five guests present. The pledge of allegiance was given, and introductions were made.

The minutes of the last meeting were published in the newsletter. The report was approved upon motion by Jerry K8CAT, seconded by Frank WA8WHP.

Mary Ann KB8IVS reported the treasury balances. The report was approved upon motion by George K3GP, seconded by Matt KC8RYG.

Old business: Don K8OMO discussed the Weather Net Test on March 20th. Our mission should be determined to identify what is needed when that net is needed.

There were 13 members at the Skywarn meeting on March 20th...

There were 14 members at the 'Super Meeting" of area clubs on March 27th.

Don K8OMO is checking the UHF repeater. New crystals and tuning may be all that is needed to be able to use it as a backup or portable unit.

The Mile Branch Grange Fair booth availability has been set up. Other planning may include ATV demonstration.

Massillon ARC has invited us to help with their hamfest. Further discussion is needed.

Dave W8UKQ suggested starting a net on the 70 cm. band. Upon discussion, Jim K8LTG approved the use of the 442.35 MHz repeater, and Don K8OMO approved use of W8LKY. The net will be on Thursdays at 2130 L and after the conclusion of the 2 meter net. Dave will begin as NCS for a trial period during April.

Securing name tags was discussed. A vendor at the Super Meeting will make them for \$9. They can be made here at the Hospital for \$10. A public authority should be included on the badge to have an official status. David N8NLZ will check with the Hospital.

Jim K8LTG reported that he is working on the 2 meter repeater. The April 4 net may be on Simplex.

A copy of a thank you letter to the Washington Township Trustees was made available for inspection. New business: The premium for the liability policy is due May 6. Don K8OMO moved that the premium be paid. The motion was seconded by Larry AA8NV, and approved upon vote.

ARES applications are available. A brochure from the Canton ARC was displayed.

Conditions for the Breezeshooters contest were marginal.

Gladys KB8GIA suggested having Joe Warther, an accordionist, for the Christmas party. Gladys moved to make the reservation with him. The motion was seconded by Ray K8DEN, and approved upon vote.

The 50-50 drawing was won by Matt KC8RYG.

A drawing for a repeater directory was won by Mary Ann KB8IVS.

The meeting adjourned at 8:26 P. M., upon motion by Matt KC8RYG, seconded by Larry KE8VE.

was Dave's last edition of the Zero Beat. Dan Mutigli, N8LVO, took over as editor the next month.

I remember that Field day site vividly. I had my usual dipole antenna attached to the top of my extension ladder which was standing straight up, not too far from the road. Passing motorists were doing double takes all weekend long when they saw that ladder. It was just a little too far to see the guy wires or the antenna.

An article in the Zero Beat indicated FCC the was cracking down o n "freebanders". Quite a few were caught operating in the band space between the CB band and 10 meters, including an Extra class ham who was also a VE. Offenders were expected to be fined about \$2000, although, fines could go as high as \$20,000. Another article mentioned an FCC sting operation to catch people involved in VE testing fraud.

Fifteen Years Ago, Ron Gwynne, KC8VG, AKA WC8F was Ham of the Month. Don had done a fine presentation on the Dayton Hamvention at the previous meeting.
