Iraq Back on the Air!

Diya Sayah, YI1DZ, President of the Iraqi Amateur Radio Society (IARS), announced November 13 that effective November 20, all Amateur Radio activity will be "back to normal" in Iraq. Sayah said, "All Amateur Radio operators in Iraq who carry a valid Iraqi license will be able to use their radios according to regulations of IARU Region 1 and the IARS."

Amateur Radio activity in Iraq was suspended in March of this year, with the suspension affecting both Iraqi citizens as well as any foreigners -- including military personnel and contractors -- who have been on the air from Iraq. The request to halt all ham radio activity and the issuance of licenses in Iraq originated with a letter from the Iraqi Ministry of Defense to Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki as part of a new security plan, Sayah said. (TNX ARRL Letter Vol. 26, No. 46)

November 7, 2007

The regular meeting of the Alliance Amateur Radio Club was held at the Alliance Community Hospital on November 7, 2007 at 7:30 PM with club president Jim Ferguson, K8LTG presiding. For the secretary's report Don, AB8KV noted that the October minutes were in the newsletter. He then reported that he had ordered a floral arrangement on behalf of the club for the funeral of Jack, W8WEN, and sent a condolence card to the family. The secretary's report was approved on a motion from Joe, KC8TAC and seconded by Howard, K8DXR.

Mary Ann, KB8IVS gave the treasurer's report. The report was approved on a motion from Dave, N8NLZ and seconded by Joe, KC8TAC.

Old business:

There were no old business items brought up for discussion. **New business:**

- Don, K8OMO gave a report on the funeral for Jack, W8WEN with additional comments from George, K3GP. Don had also brought along a condolence card for everyone present at the meeting to sign, which was then passed around. He asked for approval to add the rest of the club members' names to the card, which was readily granted.
- Don also noted that a person or persons were needed who were interested in installing the Homeland Security radio equipment and antenna at the hospital. He noted that the cabling route posed a problem, but a potential inside route existed through a chase at the rear of the kitchen.
- President Jim then reminded the

Florida Hams Help Nab Burglary Suspects

Some hams in Florida got an earful when they heard what turned out to be teenagers planning various robberies over the Jupiter Farms 444.400 MHz CERT repeater.

On September 8, Al Moreschi, AG4BV, of Jupiter, and John Levey, KI4HTL, a retired police officer, of Palm Beach Gardens, overheard, according to Moreschi, "what sounded like men talking about committing a burglary and we were monitoring them on one of the local ham repeaters."

Moreschi said he and his fellow hams notified local law enforcement agencies of the break-in, but the alleged thieves "didn't describe the house well enough to get the exact address." The amateurs kept listening for the vandals to show up again on the repeater.

On September 21, they were in luck. This time the hams were ready and had set up recording devices to capture the break-in as it transpired. Moreschi said he and his fellow hams recognized the voices and started recording; they also called the police. The last transmission heard over the air by the suspects was, "Code Red, Code Red, Code Red. There are cops everywhere, dude!"

Three suspects were captured and arrested: one at the scene, one who was walking down a nearby road and one at a local grocery store. An official with the local sheriff's office said that the suspects were charged with burglary for the two break-ins; the three are suspects in other local robberies, as well.

The tapes made by the hams are in the custody of the sheriff. Moreschi said that the suspects might also be facing charges from the Federal Communications Commission for operating without an amateur license. "We don't know how these kids got hold of the ham radios.

Their transmissions came right over the CERT repeater, and that has a special tone and you have to have a special tone to key it up," Moreschi said. *(TNX ARRL Letter, September 28, 2007)*

2007 Field Day Results

Thanks go out to George, K3GP who reports that the 2007 Field Day results have been posted on the ARRL website. The results are located at <u>http://www.arrl.org/</u><u>members-only/contests/results/2007/</u><u>FD/</u>.

Our 2007 Field Day operation was held at our usual location behind Marllington Middle School.

We placed 70th, out of 278 entries in our class. Our final score was 3,800 Pts, a 21% drop from last years effort. In the accompanying table, I've listed the data for the last 6 years. But the data doesn't tell the whole story.

The weekend weather was excellent, The generators ran flawlessly, and the food was great. Subway did their usual good job of keeping us fed, though the price did increase this year, so we need to talk about this before we commit to them for next year.

We broke some new ground this year. For the first time, we used a wireless computer network for logging. The network performed as expected, with very few problems.

A big thank you goes out to Sam, KC8ETZ, for setting up the server, and being on site for those problems which did arise.

Also, a big thank you to Don, K8OMO, who again brought his crane truck out for the weekend. He's been doing this for more Field Days that I can remember. Using the crane truck sure beats erecting towers, and antennas by hand!

The N3FJP software turned out to be inadequate. It worked fine for the operating side of things, but when it came time to generate the results for submission to the league, George had to export the logs to WriteLog for the job of doing the after-contest paperwork. But, in my opinion, the networked software is the way to go.

Not one to wait till the last minute, George, K3GP has already been investigating other software packages for our 2008 effort. Stay tuned! (*KD8MQ*)

D-DAY!

You may have not noticed, but on 17 February 2009 the television you are probably watching will go dark. That is the last day of analog television in the U.S.A. This is the result of Congress saying we will go to digital the next day.

If you are on cable or satellite you will be able to go on watching for a time. These will not be affected at that time.

If you have a television purchased after the first of this year it will have the digital tuner included. However, If you have an older set it may or may not have the digital tuner. If the latter is the case you will need a set-top box for each set. There is nothing magical about DTV, it is just another modulation mode which is not the same as the digital mode used for cable or satellite.

Your antennas and cable will work the same as RF is RF. The government is issuing, after Jan 1st., two vouchers worth \$40.00 each to each household requesting them.

Reception will be all or

nothing. You will get a perfect picture/sound or nothing. The signal may lock up even on a strong signal. This is caused by multipath which confuses the decoder in the tuner. If it sees more than one signal of approximately the same strength but slightly different in time of arrival the demodulator will not know which to process so it will do nothing. The better the beam pattern of your antenna the less this will be a problem.

I have been using an omnidirectional antenna at 20 feet above ground and cars going by will cause a problem. However, I get good results overall. An antenna with better height and pattern will give much better results.

The FCC has allowed stations to keep their analog channel designation for their digital channels. For instance, although we transmit our digital on 39 your decoder will see it as 17.

Redeem those IRC's

Redeem Those Soon-to-Expire International Reply Coupons. If you have old US-issued International Reply Coupons (IRCs), they can still be redeemed, but you need to do it very soon.

IRCs issued prior to 2002 (the old small ones) can be redeemed for one penny less than the issue (stamped) price, and must be redeemed by October 10. IRCs with an expiration date of December 31, 2006 can also be redeemed for one penny less than the issue price; these must be submitted to the post office by September 1, 2008.

USPS Rate Changes Introduces some "Gotchas"



The recent postal rate increase from 39 to 41 cents has been generating some interesting conservations on various internet reflectors. It's not so much the rate increase itself, but rather a "gotcha" that seems to be "getting" some QSL'ers.


It's quite common to use a standard 6 X 9 "clasp" envelope. In fact, early all

QSL bureaus mail their cards to you in this type of envelope. Also, services such as WF5E typically use these types of envelopes. However the U.S. Postal Service seems to be more diligently enforcing a "non-machinable" surcharge. From the USPS website, the issue seems to be the clasp.

2. A letter-size piece is non-machinable (see 6.4) if it has one or more of the following characteristics (see 601.1.4 to determine the length, height, top and bottom of a mailpiece):

C. Has clasps, strings, buttons, or similar closure devices.

Should your envelope get hit with the additional charge, be prepared to pay 58 cents, instead of the typical 41. (*TNX WorldRadio, September 2007, Editor, Nance Kott, WZ8C*)



December, 1987, (editor N8IAK)
