The day for the February Fox Hunt Practice Run was beautiful, except for the temperature.

The fox was set to low power, and the antenna was a simple rubber duck. Since that part of the park was still closed to vehicular traffic, a bit of a hike was required to reach the box. We had a slight problem starting the box, but by 1:20. it was running. Signal strength was low, but acceptable at the castle. This was due to the rubber duck antenna which was being used. With each hunt, a little more is learned. :-)

The hunt will be


