December Minutes

December 1, 2010

The regular meeting of the Alliance Amateur Radio Club was held on December 1, 2010 at 7:30 PM at Alliance Community Hospital with club President John Myers (KD8MQ) presiding. The pledge of allegiance was recited followed by introductions. There were 9 members present along with Miriam Sanor and guest speaker Mark Perna.

President John announced birthdays for the month, including Sam (KC8ETZ) and Jessie (KD8KDK).

For the Secretary's report Don, (AB8KV) noted that the minutes for November were in the newsletter, and that he had procured the flowers for the funeral of Bob (K8RLS) as well as having sent a sympathy card to the family on behalf of the club. The report was approved on motion by Frank ิล (WA8WHP) and seconded by Tom (KD8JRK).

Treasurer Mary Ann (KB8IVS) then gave the Treasurer's report.

She noted that the club's current bank was starting to charge a maintenance fee and so she had combined the savings and checking accounts to try to maintain a high enough balance to avoid the fee. However, she added that she was actively looking for another bank where the fee(s) might be avoided. The Treasurer's report was then approved on a motion by Tom and seconded by Ben (KD8KMQ).

Old business & committee reports:

•President John reminded the club about upcoming activities, including the Christmas party on December 11 at Pancho's and that he was open to suggestions for programs for the coming year.

•For ARES, Don (K8OMO) stated that the most recent Homeland Security net operation had gone very well.

•Frank then reported that he had more cell phones to turn in for the club's fund raiser, and urged the members to talk up the program to get more donations of used phones.

•John then noted that Field Day 2011 was on the agenda for discussion, but he suggested that it be tabled until the January meeting when attendance was expected to be higher.

January, 1996 (Editor, WX8G)

• Gladys Wilson, KB8GIA was chosen as the AARC's 1995 Ham Of The Year; an excellent choice!

• Bill Parks, K8JZN had passed away. If you were active in Ham Radio in Stark County at that time, then you had met Bill!

• Our program for the January meeting was a video on Kenwood's new rig, the TS-870.

•Citing a lack of time (or perhaps it was poor time management?), I had announced my impending retirement from the editing of the club newsletter. Immediately after making this announcement, my hard drive began making this weird noise!

• In 1996, the Dayton Hamvention was

• Articles for the newsletter could be submitted as an ASCII file on a $3\frac{1}{2}$, or $5\frac{1}{4}$ disc. No internet yet, so direct transfer via packet, or modem was available via KE8VE.

• FCC vanity callsign application form 610-V was available, but not being accepted yet for filing. The FCC had mailed out 9000 copies of the form, in preparation for the opening of the first gate sometime in the early part of 1996.

• The AARC Santa Net was coming up.

January, 2001, (Editor, KD8MQ)

• Jerry, KG8RN was awarded the plaque for 2000 **Ham Of The Year**.

• AO-40 had been knocked off the air during a maneuver intended to raise it's apogee to 50 KM. A stuck helium valve resulted in a final apogee of 60 KM, and knocked the satellite off the air until a reset was done. Ground controllers had yet to reload the operating system. No
