#### August, 1989, (editors KB8GCE & KB8GCF)

- The August meeting was to be held at Butler-Rodman Park, prior to the club picnic.
- There was an editorial from Pam, N8IAK, pointing out the need for elmers; Someone who could mentor new hams, help them get on the air, etc. As relevant now, as it was then.
- The program for the previous club meeting was on Ni-Cad batteries, and was presented by Ed, N8GZE.
- Novice classes were due to begin in Early September. The instructor was KD8MQ.
- Operators were needed for the upcoming Carnation triathlon.

#### There were no August, 1994, or 1999 issues

#### August, 2004, (editor KE8VE)

• KE8VE reminded us all that when we key the microphone, it is just as if we were standing at

- The Field Day numbers for 2009 were posted. We were up slightly over the 2008 scores.
- We had just participated in the first Interclub Fox hunt ever held in Stark County. The three clubs, Alliance, Massillon, and Canton came together to hold a fox hunt.
- There was an article on "Attenuators: passive vs active".
- Frank Piper, KI8GW had been appointed to fill out the expired term of Joe Phillips, K8QOE, who had recently become an SK.
- Don, K8OMO took up the hobby of pretzel straightening, Using a 700 lb. piece of sandstone, to straighten his damaged tower.

# **The Scarlet Carnation**

In a couple of weeks, we'll be running our W8LKY Carnation Days special event. The purpose is to commemorate Alliance, OH as the birthplace of the state flower; the Scarlet Carnation.

Here's some trivia on the Scarlet Carnation that you can work into your on the air conversation. Yes, you too can be a Scarlet Carnation expert!

- First created in 1866, it was dubbed the "Lamborn Red" after it's creator; Dr. Levi Lamborn.
- Dr. Lamborn opposed William McKinley in the race for the 18th Congressional District in 1876. Before each debate, he would present Mr. McKinley with a "Lamborn Red" Boutonniere.
- Mr. McKinley adopted the flower as a good luck charm. He wore one at all times, and kept a ready supply on his desk to present to guests.
- On Sept. 14, 1901, moments after removing the flower from his lapel and giving it to a young admirer at the Buffalo Exposition, McKinley was killed by an assassin's bullet.
- The Scarlet Carnation was named the Ohio state flower on February 3, 1904.
- Alliance was recognized by the Ohio Legislature on April 1, 1959 as the Carnation City.
- Carnations are not actually grown in Alliance.

## Paper Chase by Joe Wehner, W8KNO

I hope you were able to work the D-Day special event stations in June. If you missed out you will have a second chance on the 22nd and 23rd of this month with the D-Day Reenactment from Conneaut, Ohio. Remember this year is the 70th Anniversary of Normandy Landing.

The Conneaut Amateur Radio Club, W8BHZ,will commemorate this event on both days from 9:00 A.M. till 3:00 P.M. on 7.240 MHz and 14.240 Mhz. A special QSL is available from: CARC ARS W8BHZ, PO Box 661, Conneaut, OH 44030.



The Conneaut event is the largest annual D-Day Reenactment in the US. Commemorating D-Day-June 6th 1944 . For more information visit: http:// www.ddayohio.us/schedule.htm.

Since 1999, this annual recreation of the amphibious Allied landings upon the beaches of Normandy has thrilled thousands of spectators. The event occurs within the beautifully kept grounds of Conneaut Township Park and assembles hundreds of reenactors from across the United States and Canada. Remarkably, the 250 yard long beach and sloping adjacent terrain closely resembles Omaha Beach. Spectators will witness men, women, and their machines perform a living tribute to the veterans of WWII through dress, mock battles, and living history displays. Meet the real men and women that lived through these times. Last year the event hosted over 100 WWII veterans and it is hoped to have even more this year.

If you have never attended, the experience is called the most realistic and educational D-Day reenactment of the WWII era.

Admission is free but donations of any size are appreciated as the event is 100% funded by donations. If you attend, you will find the event just off Interstate 90 at Exit 241, 5 miles E of the Pennsylvania border.

In order to make room for more things to see, there is no longer any onsite parking at the park. There are ample parking areas around town served by our speedy shuttles both Friday and Saturday. Mobility impaired persons and veterans of WWII-Vietnam can park at the CN Dock Company on Day Street, at which a wheelchair accessible van stops approximately every 15-20 minutes. Spectators can park at multiple lots around town. Watch for signs in town as you arrive for the most updated parking information, as some lots will close as they fill up quicker then others.
